## Small Groups \& Agendas

Students should continue checking their calendars daily to see when they have small group meetings, to look for the WIN time links which will be added, and for sessions that we will invite them to for extra support. Small groups are important to allow us to touch base with students and give targeted practice at their level. To support students with attending sessions, both homerooms will be using their Barnwell agendas to write down their sessions and times, record assignment due dates, and to record book club reading pages. This will help them to plan out their day as well as be able to show you their schedule.

## WIN Time

During WIN time, we are asking that students work on iReady unless they see a calendar link for a small group meeting. This is daily 12:30-1:00. In $5^{\text {th }}$ grade, students are expected to spend one hour per subject working adaptively in i-Ready. One hour for math, one hour for reading weekly. Students will be setting iReady goals for number of lessons passed.

## UPCOMING TOPICS WITH MRS. ROPER

## Reading

Book Clubs are in full swing. Students are meeting for book club discussions based on agreed upon pages read. Students are jotting as they read to bring their thoughts to the discussion. The students will also be examining what a discussion at the fifth- grade level should look like. We will see a model book club and determine what each book club should focus on to raise the level of their discussions.

This week we continue with character analysis and jotting our thoughts to track the changes in a character. Students will have a graded assignment on inferencing about a character and backing up their inferences with textual evidence. This week, students will also be working in Freckle, which is similar to Study Island. Students will have an assignment to help determine their specific phonics and word attack skills. Starting next week, students will be working in Freckle for word study a few times each week. I will be asking the students to spend 30 minutes weekly on word study. Students who need more support with this may be asked to work for longer periods of time as their schedule allows. Any students who missed one of their small groups should check their Humanities Class Notebook to see the reading schedule that the group set. To do this, they should follow these steps.

## Social Studies

This week in Social Studies, we discussed September $11^{\text {th }}$, the Memorial that stands at Ground Zero, the increase in patriotism after 9/11 and how the events on that day still impact America today. Next week, students will continue on the topic of $9 / 11$ and America's response to terrorism, and will have an assignment in Gallopade, their Social Studies online resource. I will walk them through how to access this online. This topic overlaps with our read aloud that we are doing throughout the week in reading as the main character, Deja is uncovering information about her family's past, and how that impacts her today. Students will also have an asynchronous assignment to build on our previous lessons of primary sources. This will be a recorded lesson where students watch the lesson, and then complete the accompanying assignment.

## Writing-Students meet with their homeroom teachers for Writing.

Students will be revising their original narratives and will be working with peer writing buddies in break out rooms in Microsoft Teams. We will be looking at building the plot using a story mountain format that helps students write a story that has a clear message, and after revisions, a theme. These skills are both in the elaboration and craft section of their writer's checklists.

## UPCOMING TOPICS WITH MRS. STEMNISKI

## On Level Math:

This week we will review place value from millions to thousandths place. Students should be able to read and write these numbers in standard, word, and expanded form. We will also begin multiplying and dividing by powers of ten. A classwork grade will be taken on Thursday.

## Advanced Level Math:

As we move further along in our study of fractions, we will use models (bar diagrams and fraction squares) and multiply fractions. Students will be expected to provide answers in simplified form. A classwork grade will be taken on Thursday.

Science: We will have our science class on Friday in lieu of math starting September $18^{\text {th }}$. I offer an additional science meeting in the afternoon on Tuesdays and highly recommend students attend. The afternoon meeting is not mandatory, but I will expand and practice the science skills we are working on.

Writing: This week in writing, we continue to write small moment narratives. Our primary focus is on elaboration and writer's craft. By the end of the week, you student should have a story written using the techniques we have learned in class.
